Thousands of Texans say "No" to Underfunding and Over-testing

A crowd of more than 12,000 teachers, students, families and community leaders converged on the State Capitol today to tell lawmakers to fix a broken testing system and return billions of dollars in education funding cut by the 2011 legislature

"The legislature is failing our children by refusing to restore the \$5.4 billion that was taken from our students last legislative session," said Senator Kirk Watson. "It's past time to talk about the kids."

Did you know:

- Texas spends 25 percent less on public education than it did 10 years ago, accounting for inflation and student population growth.
- Texas slashed \$5.4 billion from public education in 2011, resulting in teacher layoffs, larger classes, school closures statewide, and the loss of college scholarships, dropout prevention, pre-K and other vital programs.
- These cuts were based solely on faulty budget projections Texas now has a budget surplus of \$8.8 billion plus nearly \$9 billion in the "Rainy Day" fund.
- Lawmakers didn't take a penny from the \$500 million private contract for standardized testing.
- A judge recently ruled that the way Texas funds schools unconstitutional due to insufficient funding and unfair distribution.
- Despite a budget surplus, Texas lawmakers now want to keep kids
 waiting while legal appeals drag on, rather than restore the money they took
 from Texas students in 2011.
